What Is Shabbat and Why Is It Celebrated?

Shabbat (Strong's word H 7676, meaning "intermission; rest; repose") is a fundamental day of celebration to God. Known as "Sabbath" in English, it is the first of *B* **Festivals of God**, as delineated in *Leviticus 23*. These Levitical Festivals are to be <u>times of great celebration</u>, a "holy convocation" commemorating what God <u>has done</u>, what He <u>is doing</u>, and what He <u>will yet do</u> in the future. They <u>typify God's redemptive plan for mankind</u>, with Shabbat being the first, and therefore, foundational observance. By studying and observing these festivals, we not only honor God as a living sacrifice (Rom. 12:1), we learn of His nature, and how he would have us live our lives. Romans 12:2 says

"And do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed <u>by the renewing of your mind</u>, so that you may prove what the will of God is, that which is good and acceptable and perfect". NASU

Shabbat is a weekly opportunity to "*renew your mind*" with the things of God, so that your walk with God in the upcoming week will be strengthened and encouraged.

Of the variety of Shabbat's meanings, "<u>rest</u>" underlies them all. It celebrates the miracle of Creation, and the time of rest that followed (Gen. 2:2-3, and Ex. 20:11), during which we <u>focus</u> on our God as Creator, Father, Counselor, and Deliverer (instead of the common, created aspects of daily life). Psalm 92 describes the ideal heart of Shabbat observers ...

Ps 92:5-6 - "For, Adonai, <u>what you do makes me happy</u>; I<u>take joy in what your hands have made</u>. 6(5) <u>How great are your deeds</u>, Adonai! <u>How very deep your thoughts</u>!" CJB

This awe-inspiring "<u>time-out for God</u>" takes the form of prayer, praise, worship, and study of His Word (Bible).

- We share our concerns and questions with each other, always searching for God's answers to our questions (Acts 17:11, Matt. 22:29, Mark 12:24, Luke 24:32, Luke 24:45, Rom. 15:4, 1 Tim. 4:13, 2 Tim. 3:16).
- We sing and dance, making a joyful noise to the Lord (Ps. 66:1, Ps. 81:1, Ps. 95:1, Ps. 98:4, Ps. 100:1).
- We encourage each other in our Faith in God and His Son, Yeshua (1 Thess. 4:18, 1 Thess. 5:11, 2 Tim. 4:2, Titus 1:9, Titus 2:6, Heb. 3:13, Heb. 10:25).
- We seek to build each other up as willing servants (Acts 20:32, Eph. 4:11-12, Jude 20, 1 Cor. 14:12, Rom. 15:2).
- We reverently seek the awesome presence of God (1 Chron. 13:8, 1 Chron. 16:11, Ps. 105:4, 2 Chron. 7:14).

In doing these things as a celebration to God, we <u>"keep" (that is, "properly observe"</u>) the fourth commandment (Ex. 20:8 and Dt. 5:12), and we honor God, as He requested in Lev. 23:3. He (God) will in turn honor and bless us by <u>teaching our hearts, minds, and spirits of Him and of His Calling on our lives.</u>
